MAUNDY THURSDAY

Maundy Thursday holds deep spiritual significance for many religious and fraternal traditions, including Freemasonry. Within the Scottish Rite of Freemasonry, particularly in the Southern Jurisdiction of the United States, Maundy Thursday is commemorated as a solemn day of remembrance, humility, and renewal. It is a time for Freemasons to reflect on their duties, and the principles of brotherhood, and the eternal truths of life and death.

Traditionally, Maundy Thursday is observed on the Thursday before Easter and marks the Last Supper of Jesus Christ and his disciples. The term “Maundy” comes from the Latin word *mandatum*, meaning “commandment,” referencing Jesus’ commandment to love one another as he loved them. This message of love, humility, and service resonates strongly within the teachings of Freemasonry, which emphasizes moral integrity, charity, and universal brotherhood.

In the Masonic context, Maundy Thursday is observed through a ritual known as the “Mystic Banquet” or “Ceremony of Extinguishing of the Lights,” as explained in the 18°, Knight of the Rose Croix. This ceremony is not simply a religious observance; rather, it is a deeply symbolic rite that blends Masonic philosophy with elements of early Christian tradition. It is an occasion to honor the ideas of sacrifice, rebirth, and spiritual enlightenment.

The ceremony of the Mystic Banquet is designed to be introspective and moving. It recalls the themes of the Last Supper, but within a symbolic framework that encourages the participant to contemplate the triumph of light over darkness, knowledge over ignorance, and spirit over materialism. Candles are extinguished one

by one during the ritual, representing the fading of truth and virtue in the world, and then one candle is relit – symbolizing hope, resurrection and the enduring light of truth. This act serves as a powerful reminder that even in the darkest of times, light and wisdom endure.

Unlike typical Masonic meetings, the Maundy Thursday observance is open to non-Masons and family members, depending on the lodge and jurisdiction. It provides an opportunity to demonstrate the moral and philosophical foundations of Freemasonry to a wider audience while reinforcing the spiritual obligations that Masons undertake in their personal and collective journeys.

For many Freemasons, Masonic Maundy Thursday is a cornerstone of their spiritual year. It is not merely a ritual – it is a time to renew their personal commitments to virtue, to remember those who have passed, and to seek a deeper understanding of their place in the universe. It speaks to the heart of Masonic ideals: that all people are connected by a shared divine essence and that through brotherly love and selfless service, the world can be made better.

In a world too often marked by division and discord, Masonic Maundy Thursday offers a moment of unity, reflection, and quiet strength – a sacred space to honor the enduring light within all of us.

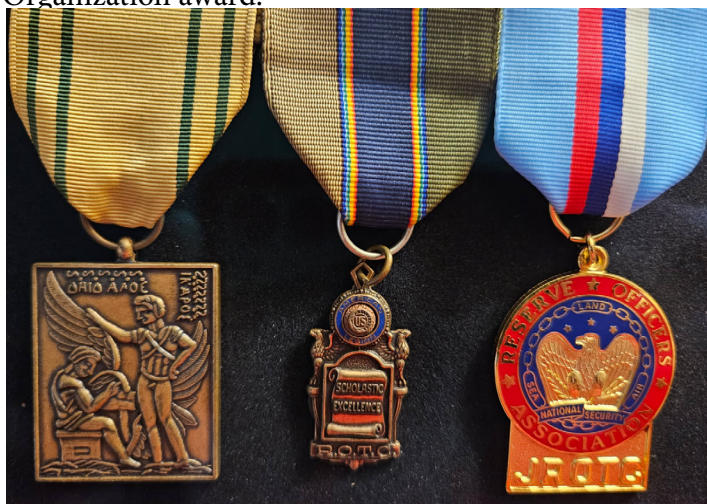
AWARDS MAKE SERVICE UNFORGETTABLE

4. Not have been a previous recipient of this award

The first time doing that will have come at Terry Sanford High School, my alma mater.

THOUGHTS FROM THE VALLEY OF FRANKLIN

The Valley of Franklin has set a few goals for 2025 under the leadership of Venerable Master Brian Jenkins. Since we are currently just a Lodge of Perfection, we want to grow beyond our current status to include a Chapter of Rose Croix, Council of Kadosh, and Consistory. While we cannot expect to achieve all three additional bodies within this calendar year, we certainly want to lay the groundwork positioning ourselves for full Valley status as quickly as possible. Other goals for 2025 include membership expansion, improved website and communication presence, and increased Blue Lodge outreach. That said, the Valley of Franklin has some unique challenges. Given the sparsely populated mountains of Western North Carolina, many members need to travel an hour or more to attend our monthly meetings. As such, VM Jenkins has committed to “travelling” Reunions, through which we go to distant Blue Lodges to confer the degrees. We tried this last year, with great success.

Finally, in addition to our monthly stated communications, we want to start having special Scottish Rite meetings at distant Blue Lodges. These meetings will be for Masonic education, degree practice, and just plain fellowship. In doing so, we expect to shrink the distance for our current and prospective members so they may be more active participants in the Valley.
