WHO CAN BEST WORK AND BEST AGREE

I can guarantee that at some point in your life, you've faced the challenge of choosing a side on an issue. Perhaps you've heard something like, "You're either with us or against us." This "us versus them" mentality isn't new; it predates social media and has long been ingrained in society. As a Freemason, I've witnessed too many brothers in our Craft quarrel unnecessarily. A particular line from the Master Mason's degree has stirred my curiosity as I grow in knowledge and virtue, and I believe you know it too: "One sacred band, or society of friends and brothers, among whom no contention should ever exist but that noble contention, or rather emulation, of who best can work and best agree."

Too often, I've seen brothers forget this seemingly simple yet profound message. We are first reminded that, as the Craft, we are a society of friends and brothers. The Cambridge Dictionary defines contention as disagreement resulting from opposing arguments. Emulation, conversely, is the act of striving to equal

or surpass something achieved by another. These two words are deliberately placed together for a reason. This lesson is so striking that the Senior Warden reminds us at every communication: "...none should go away dissatisfied, harmony being the strength and support of all institutions, more especially of ours!"

Instead of discord and disharmony, let us strive to find common ground, remembering that we all act upon the level. On this level, we can communicate honestly and openly, leaving our egos and self-importance at the West Gate. Lead by example, my brothers. Agree to disagree respectfully and with decorum, and perhaps society at large will recognize you as the gentleman you are.

Fayetteville had the most members in attendance at the Biennial to see the charter for the Marquis de Lafayette Chapter officially delivered.

A month later, the SGIG of the Orient of North Carolina, Ill. A. Gene Cobb Jr., announced that Fayetteville had finished in a tie for Valley of the Year honors with New Bern. Fayetteville was also the inaugural recipient of the Soaring Eagle award, given in memory of Ill. Steve Lynch to the Valley with the largest percentage of growth since the 2023 Biennial. Fayetteville will retain the latter plaque for at least the next two years.
