As summer vacations end, the Scottish Rite turns toward its Fall Reunion Season. The Grand Lodge leadership is busy making final preparations for Annual Communication. Our role is to provide as much support as possible to our leadership in their preparation.

Every two years, the SGIG receives recommendations from the Personal Representatives regarding men who are to be considered for the investiture of the Knight Commander Court of Honor (red cap) and the Inspector General Honorary 33° (white cap). These are not Valley honors. They are given and governed only by the Supreme Council, Southern Jurisdiction USA, Mother Council of the World, and require a unanimous vote.

Due to North Carolina's membership losses over the last twenty years, our quotas have dramatically decreased regarding the number of honors we can bestow. The only way we can change our quota is to grow the membership, and the best way to do that is to remember and faithfully adhere to the obligations we assumed from degrees one through thirty-three. Our positive words, actions, and attitudes will always have a lasting impact on membership. I've seen this impact in every Valley in North Carolina.

Each Valley has its method of gathering recommendations for the SGIG to nominate overseen by the SGIG Personal Representative. For your situational awareness, all names given to me were considered, whether they came from the

Personal Representative or another member of the Scottish Rite.

Here's why? When I was appointed to this office, the late Illustrious John Elmore 33° said, "Gene, everything will be fine if you remember that all of us are 32° Masons." Long ago, I learned that we meet one another on the level, and act by the plumb, we can always part on the square.

I sincerely congratulate all our honor men for the Class of 2025 and thank everyone who made due and timely recommendations, especially the Personal Representatives.

Now, here is another update. The Red, White, and Blue Banquet will recognize not only the Knight Commander Court of Honor and Inspector General Honorary elects, but also those who, since 2024, have been faithful to the Scottish Rite for fifty years. They wear blue caps. They are the bedrock of Scottish Rite, no matter what degree they have, and all of us are better for it.

This year, our Red, White, and Blue banquet will also recognize Illustrious and Most Worshipful Richard Groves Moore, 33° for his fifty years as an Inspector General Honorary. As we congratulate and celebrate these honorable men, let us also unite in friendship, morality, and brotherly love to celebrate one another!

I already know that in two years, we will still be saying, "It's that time of year again!"

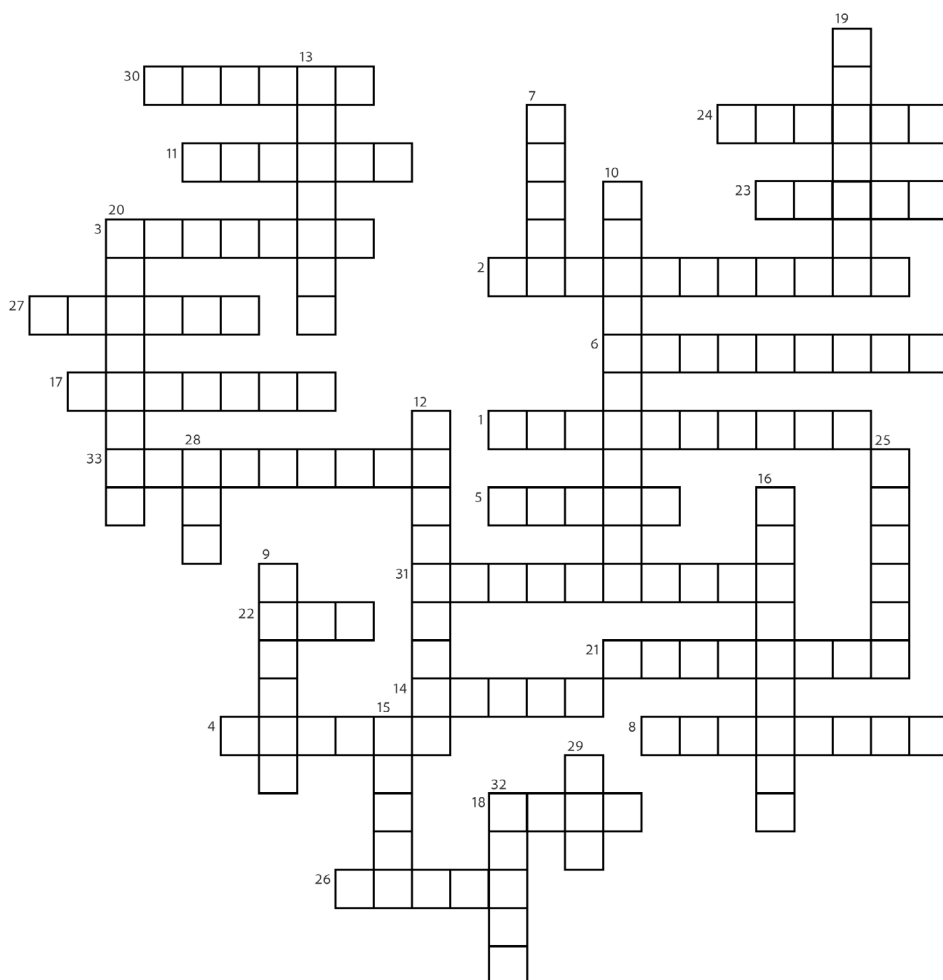

WHAT IS AN HONORARY INSPECTOR GENERAL

Congratulations to all the recently appointed Honorary Inspector Generals in the Orient of North Carolina. You should be proud of this great accomplishment in your Masonic career.

BUT WHAT DOES THIS TITLE MEAN?

An Honorary Inspector General, more formally known as a 33° Scottish Rite Mason, holds the highest honorary degree conferred by the Scottish Rite of Freemasonry. This title is not part of the standard progression through the Scottish Rite degrees but instead a recognition of exceptional merit, service, leadership and the great things we expect out of you in the future. It is granted to a select group of Freemasons who have demonstrated outstanding dedication to the principles of Freemasonry, as well as significant contributions to the fraternity and the wider community.

The Scottish Rite itself is an appendant body of Freemasonry, which confers degrees beyond the basic three of the Craft or Blue Lodge Masonry. These degrees, ranging from the 4th to the 32nd, delve into moral, philosophical, and spiritual teachings through allegory and ritual. The 33rd degree, titled Sovereign Grand Inspector General, is honorary and represents the pinnacle of recognition within the Rite.

To become an Honorary Inspector General, a Mason must first be a 32° Scottish Rite Mason in good standing. He must hold that rank for 44 months and then if nominated and appointed by the Supreme Council, he is awarded the Knight Commander to the Court of Honour, which he must hold for 44 months. If after this time he is recommended by his peers and then

nominated by the SGIG or leader of his Orient (State) he is appointed by the Supreme Council as an Honorary Inspector General. This process is highly selective and reflects not only Masonic accomplishments but also a Mason's commitment to the ethical values and charitable aims of the organization.

Contrary to common misconceptions, receiving the 33rd degree does not confer any authority or rank above other Masons in the everyday governance of lodges or Scottish Rite bodies. All Masons are on the same "level". It is rather symbolic of a Mason's enduring commitment and contributions. The title Honorary Inspector General acknowledges the recipient's exemplary conduct, leadership, and efforts to uphold the values of Freemasonry, such as brotherhood, integrity, justice, and philanthropy.

Ceremonially, the conferral of the 33rd degree is often a solemn and dignified event, held at special convocations or biennial sessions of the Supreme Council. It is a moment of pride for the recipient and their peers, symbolizing a lifetime of dedication to Masonic values. In addition to symbolic recognition, 33rd degree Masons are often expected to continue serving as leaders, mentors, and representatives of Freemasonry in the public eye. They may be called upon to guide new members or contribute to charitable initiatives, supported by the Scottish Rite.

In summary, an Honorary Inspector General is a title that honors a Mason's extraordinary contributions to Freemasonry and society. It is not about power or rank or the color of a hat, but about recognition, celebrating those who live out the highest ideals of the fraternity with distinction, humility, and purpose.

TIPS FOR BETTER FLOORWORK

BY THOMAS POPE, 33°

Scottish Rite degree conferrals are quite different from the three degrees of the Blue Lodge. Not better, not easier, but different.

With our next reunion coming up Sept. 27 at the Fayetteville Masonic Center, a couple of Valley members were asked about the differences and how to make the most of them as cast members.

CHRIS DONAHUE, 32°

Bro. Donahue has a role in all six degrees that the Valley of Fayetteville currently confers (4-7, 14, 18), and is in charge of the 5th Degree.

"It's a little easier since you have a script right in front of you, and you don't have to 'look up' words like you do in the Blue Lodge with the OSW (Official Standard of the Work).

I try to learn only one degree at a time. The way I have always learned things is pick one sentence, or a sentence where there's some punctuation to give you a breath, and I'll repeat that over and over and over until I've got it down and can almost say it backwards. Then I'll finish that sentence, and add another and another until I've got a paragraph. Every time I add something new, I always start over from the beginning – so by the time I'm done with it, I'll have said that first part six or seven hundred times."

Daily, in-depth practice is a big thing for me, too. To this day, I still say the Apron Lecture in the Entered Apprentice degree five times a day, and the same with the Staircase Lecture. With Scottish Rite, I'll go over the parts I have in all six degrees three or four times a day.

Bro. Bell volunteered to take on the role of Venerable Master in the 7th Degree for our Sept. 27 reunion.

When you're doing degree work for the Scottish Rite, it is more than just memorizing a script. You really have to get into the part and sell it. It's all in the delivery, so you need to know the degree inside and out so you can enhance it during a performance.

You can't expect to deliver a good message when you don't understand the message yourself. I even did research on Hiram, King of Tyre, to learn about the man I was going to play before doing the 6th. I wanted to get into his head and really feel like I knew his mindset so I could portray him accurately. I believe that helps keep the candidates and the audience locked into what you're saying.

There's added pressure for me as Venerable Master with this 7th that's new for us. You have a responsibility to teach a new degree to a class, and there's the pressure of knowing there are guests there, whether it's the SGIG or members of other Valleys. You want to put your Valley in the best light possible – no pun intended.

WHO WAS JOHNSTON BLAKELY?

THE NAMESAKE FOR THE JOHNSTON BLAKELY LODGE OF PERFECTION

He then fought the Avon, of 18 guns, who struck, but he was forced to draw off on account of the approach of the Castilian, and the Tartarus. On September 12th, he captured the Briggs, three brothers and Bacctus, then the Atalanta of 18 guns and sent the latter into Savannah. This was the last ever seen of the Wasp. Months passed into years and no tidings came of her. Some thought the crew ended their lives as slaves on the Barbary Coast. Another account was given by an English Frigate that went into Cadez, much cut up, reporting an engagement with an American vessel which disappeared suddenly. Like Paul Jones of the Revolution and Symmes of the Alabama, this one vessel did valiant service in the war of 1812. He is classed as one of our great naval heroes and gratified his desire for glory. When the sea shall give up its dean then only will his fate be known. He married Miss Jane Hooper of New York and had one child, a daughter, Udney. The State of North Carolina as a tribute to his memory took her as its ward and educated her. She afterwards went to the West Indies to join her mother. She married there but died childless. There are no descendants, and his memory is all we have to cherish.

This brief account, my brethren, will illustrate

to you in one name examples of brotherly love and affection, that true friendship continues not only in life but even after death. The survivor can cherish and revere, aid and assist the offspring. That truth, courage and manhood is a rich legacy to leave even though one may die childless. The people claim the inheritance and proudly wear the jewels. Brethren, in selecting his name we show a devotedness to the high attributes of brotherly love, Relief and Truth, faithfulness and duty. No hallowed spot on Earth is allotted to him. No shrine or tablet can ever mark his last resting place. The broad Atlantic is his grave. Can we not embalm his memory here in some fitting way or at least preserve his name as a perfect Master by naming him among our first members, that oblivion may not be his lot. – Fraternally, W.B. McKoy.”
