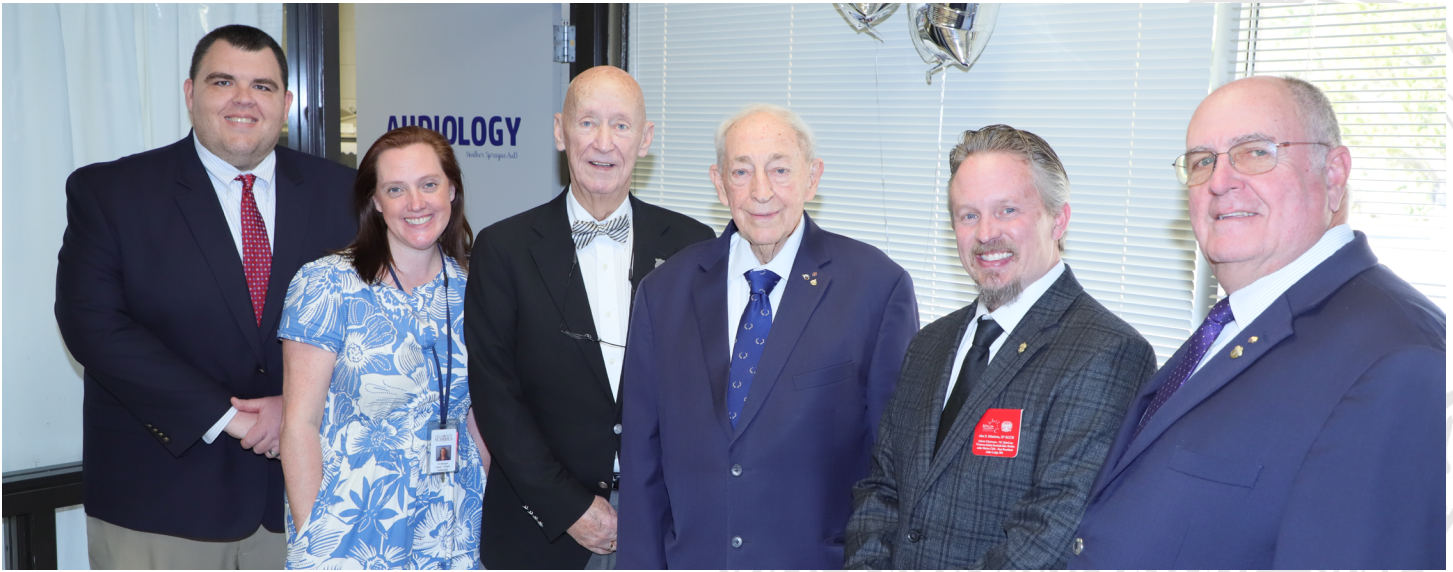

Look at what Fayetteville and Lee County have already accomplished. Are you the next one to help lead a grassroots effort?

The Golden Age of ...

NC RiteCare has begun. How and why is it different from before? That's a great question and the answer will continue to evolve during 2025. During a recent grant celebration in Lee County, how we help children with speech and language disorders has changed. We have always helped support university care outreach that supports our local communities from a more distant level, with this step forward now we can help at the grass roots, local school system level and it is truly impactful. If you take a look at 2024 the North Carolina Scottish Rite Masonic Foundation contributions for NC RiteCare assistance helped 303 children with 2,847 care visits and helped allocate 14 hearing aids to children in need. Not to mention the scholarships for undergraduate and graduate students at 3 universities across the state. Those numbers continue to increase as children have more access to quality hearing screenings and care. That brings us to our Lee County initiative. Lee County Schools has a combined student population of 10,000 students, 17 schools and now has an updated Audiology booth with top of the line equipment. This equipment is being used by Lee County Pediatric Educational Audiologist Dr. Heather Sprague, Au. D and has already benefited over 30 children by those services and another 70 projected by the end of the school year. Now, moving forward the NCSRMF and NC RiteCare have the model in place to be impactful in all 100 counties of North Carolina, from Manteo to Murphy, we have the ability to help more children. How do we find those needs? Another great question, that is where Project 100 has been launched. The Orient of North Carolina serves all 100 counties, not just those around our Valleys. Over the next few weeks we are identifying Scottish Rite members that live in all 100 counties to be our “listeners” for local communities hearing and language needs. We will have Valley information on how you can be active across the state coming soon. It is an exciting time for our Charity and now is the time.



NC Scottish Rite donates diagnostic audiology equipment to LCS in support of educational access for students with hearing challenges

SANFORD, NC - Due to a generous gift from the North Carolina Scottish Rite Masonic Foundation (NCSRMF), Lee County Schools is now better positioned to support students struggling with hearing loss and difficulties in our community. NCSRMF provided new diagnostic audiology equipment to refit the district's diagnostic testing center, expanding the ability to provide services quickly to students struggling to hear.

"When a student is having difficulty hearing they miss vital instruction," emphasized Lee County Schools Educational Audiologist, Heather Sprague. Sprague joined Lee County Schools from another district that was outfitted with a hearing clinic and knew the benefits to students and families that a testing center could have first hand. "Missing instruction can have long standing impacts on a student's academic progress, and the sooner we can get a child tested and address any issue they are having, the sooner we can get them back to learning."

NCSRMF has made it their mission to support speech and hearing programs at Universities across the state in rural areas where access to diagnostic equipment and professional audiologists is more challenging than in the state's metro areas. Lee County Schools is the first K-12 school district the organization has partnered with in support of the group's mission to give financial support for the treatment of children with speech, hearing, and learning disabilities who may receive services with little or no cost to families.

Gene Cobb serves as the Sovereign Grand Inspector General in North Carolina for the NCSRMF. With his ties to the Sanford area from serving 11 years as pastor at St. Luke United Methodist Church, this Scottish Rite partnership felt like a natural outgrowth of the group's mission. "I have a deep love for the people of Lee County," explained Cobb. "When you put that together with the Scottish Rite's commitment to helping children with speech, hearing, and learning disabilities, you have the formula for what you see happening."

MAKING A GOOD FIRST IMPRESSION

The Valley of Fayetteville's fifth reunion in 19 months marked a big change in what was offered to candidates. For the first time, the Valley brethren staged the 5th Degree, and – in its bid to earn a charter as a Chapter of Rose Croix – it put on the 18th Degree.

The candidates were a local brother, Joe Evans, who is a dual member of Phoenix 8 and Fort Bragg 667, and a courtesy candidate in Bryan Buchanan, a member of Waynesville 259.

Evans retired from the U.S. Army in 2007 after 22 years of service. A proficient Blue Lodge ritualist and a Master Mason for nearly eight years, Evans found the five-degree reunion “pretty neat because it was different. You could tell the people (in the cast) knew what they were saying.”

Buchanan left Fayetteville with the 4th through 18th degrees completed, and he will finish his Scottish Rite degree work at home in the Valley of Asheville. His experience was such that he intends to join the Valley of Fayetteville as a dual member.

“I didn't really know what to expect, but I can tell you that this day was one of the most rewarding experiences that I have ever had in my Masonic journey,” Buchanan said. “From the

time I arrived, every one of the brethren that I encountered this day were helpful and made me feel right at home. I immediately felt like a part of their family.”

Given that the theme for the reunion was “Rebuilding Western N.C.,” Buchanan was also the perfect guest speaker at lunch. A shift captain at Upper Hominy Fire and Rescue near Asheville, the 37-year fireman gave an update on recovery updates following the devastation of Hurricane Helene. He's also a member of the Saunook VFD, and is the Western Director of the North Carolina Society of Fire Rescue Instructors.

Fayetteville is hopeful of receiving a charter as a Chapter of Rose Croix at the Biennial in August. Its next reunion will be held Sept. 27, with the addition of the 7th Degree in the works.

VALLEY OF FRANKLIN PRESENTS
NCSRMF CHECK TO WESTERN
CAROLINA UNIVERSITY IN SUPPORT
OF CAMP LEAD

Members of the Valley of Franklin recently met with staff and students at the Western Carolina University College of Health and Human Sciences to present a generous grant on behalf of the North Carolina Scottish Rite Masonic Foundation in support of the upcoming Camp LEAD program, presented through the WCU Speech and Hearing clinic each summer.

The program, christened Camp LEAD (Language/Literacy Engagement and Development) began in 2021 following a previous grant from the NCSRMF that enabled the clinic to start the program. Camp LEAD is a four-week summer program designed to support school-age children with speech, language or reading impairments, including dyslexia. WCU's College of Health and Human Sciences relies upon private contributions to help meet its mission of offering quality academic experiences to students, and critical health care evaluations and treatments to underserved members of the surrounding community.

The camp is an in-person clinic program and there is no fee for attendees, to be held in the Health and Human Sciences Building on the

west campus of WCU. The program offers graduate student clinicians an opportunity to work intensively with a group of clients over the course of a month, providing students with valuable hands-on learning experiences in a clinical setting.

"We are truly grateful for the support of individuals and organizations such as the N.C. Scottish Rite Masonic Foundation," said the college's Dean, Lori Anderson. "The generosity of these partners provides scholarship assistance to our students, funding for innovative learning opportunities and the additional resources necessary to expand the services provided to the people of our region by the clinics in our college."

WHO WAS JOHNSTON BLAKELY?

THE NAMESAKE FOR THE JOHNSTON BLAKELY LODGE OF PERFECTION

Wilmington's Lodge of Perfection was established in 1909 by a group of brethren who saw the need for a Scottish Rite body in the port town. Deliberations were held on what to name this new Lodge of Perfection and tasked MWB W.B. McKoy, Past Grand Master (1912) to name it. He chose to name the new body after Johnston Blakely which prefaced his explanatory remarks with: "When you requested me to select a name for our Lodge of Perfection, I had no idea of what would be appropriate, but now associated with this task, I have a clearer view of what you require, and I hope you will not regret trusting to my choice. If my zeal has overstepped the privilege you would accord me, attribute it to my sincere desire to serve you. It is due that I should recall to you something of the history of Johnston Blakely, and I feel that you will then agree that his name is a fit selection". He then proceeded to give an address on the life and merit of our friend, Johnston Blakely:

"[Johnston Blakely] was the son of an Irish emigrant, John Blakeley and was born at Seaford, County Down, Ireland in October 1781. His father and mother settled in Charleston, South Carolina but soon after moved to Wilmington, North Carolina in 1789. John Blakely, his father, was elected to take the degrees of Masonry in

St. John's Lodge no. 1. He was raised February 12th, 1789, Henry Dayton Acting as Master. During the same year he was made Senior Deacon and Junior Warden. The lodge then held an election every six months. In January 1790, he was elected Senior Warden and filled the chairs frequently as Master. January 6th, 1792, he was made Worshipful Master and elected to attend the Grand Lodge at New Bern on September 2nd, 1792, with Past Master, Edward Jones (the brother of John Todd Jones, the Irish Patriot). In the earliest records of the Past and Master Masons lodges at Fayetteville, we find that he presided and conferred these degrees and directed the recording of the Marks of the newly made brethren. He died in 1795, and he and his wife lie buried in unmarked graves in St. James graveyard.

A strong attachment had grown up between Past Master, Edward Jones and John Blakely, and at the death of the latter, the son, Johnston Blakely then about 14 years of age, was adopted in the household of the Past Master, and brought up as his own son. Though he could ill afford the expense, his devotion to the father induced him to send the boy to the University of North Carolina.
