Provide a written report on how your Americanism initiatives have made an impact on our valley. This will be considered in any tie breaking that might occur. This document sheet can be used for that report. Narrative input is up to the Valley in regard to content. The award period is based on a Calendar year. This period will end December 15, 2026.

This is the date the Americanism criteria report is due to the chairman of the Committee on Americanism. This is intended to allow proper planning and execution within the Valley's yearly planning cycle and during one elected leadership period. The committee on Americanism will make a recommendation to the SGIG and the award will be given as soon as practical at the end of the calendar year.

MEMORIAL DAY 2026

On the 25th of May this year we gather not for the usual celebration in the usual sense, but for remembrance. Memorial Day is a sacred pause in the rhythm of our lives – a moment when we collectively step back from our routines to honor those who gave everything so that we might enjoy all the freedoms we have today. It is easy, in the busyness of modern life, to let this day pass by as just another long weekend. But that would be to miss its profound meaning. Memorial Day is not about the start of summer. It is about sacrifice, the highest sacrifice. It is about courage. It is about men and women who answered a call greater than themselves—and who never returned home. We are here because of them. We are here because at some point in our nation's history, someone stood in harm's way so that others could stand in peace. Let us reflect on the weight of that sacrifice. Across generations from the earliest days of our republic to the present, Americans have stepped forward to defend ideals that are both simple and extraordinary: liberty, justice, and the belief that all people deserve the chance to live freely. These ideas are not self-sustaining. They require protection. They require vigilance, and as history has shown they sometimes require the ultimate price. Think for a moment about what that truly means. It means a young man or woman saying goodbye to their family, perhaps believing they will return, perhaps knowing deep down that they may not. It means missed birthdays, empty seats at dinner tables, and futures left unrealized. It means parents who outlive their children. It means spouses who carry on alone. It means children who grow up with stories instead of memories. When we say, "they gave their lives," those words can feel distant, almost abstract. But behind every one of those lives is a story—rich, personal, and deeply human. They were not just soldiers, they were sons and daughters, friends and neighbors, teachers, students, dreamers, they laughed, they hoped and planned for tomorrow. And yet they put all that on the line and chose to serve. Memorial Day asks us not only to remember their sacrifice, but to understand its meaning. Why did they serve. They served because they believed in something

larger than themselves. They believed that freedom matters, not just for themselves, but for others. They believed some principles are worth defending, even at great personal cost. And they believed in America and the generations that would follow them. Memorial Day reminds us that freedom is not free. It requires the ultimate sacrifice. It reminds us that the rights we enjoy were secured by those who were willing to risk and ultimately give everything. It is simply not enough to say thank you, though gratitude is essential. Memorial Day calls us to something deeper. It calls us to live in a way that honors those who served. It means striving to be worthy of their sacrifice. It means treating one another with respect and dignity even when we disagree. It means engaging in our communities, participating in our democracy, and working to build a society that reflects the ideals they fought to protect. It means remembering that freedom carries responsibility. There is a powerful phrase often associated with Memorial Day: "We will never forget". But remembering is not just about looking backward. It is also about looking forward. We can't take our freedoms for granted. We as Masons have an advantage. We talk and study how to be a good person every day. **As Scottish Rite Masons we dive deeper into what makes us better men.** It's what we do. The men and women we honor did not see themselves as heroes. They were simply ordinary people who made extraordinary choices. They did not seek recognition or glory, they simply did what that thought was right. How do we ensure that their sacrifice is never forgotten? We tell their stories. We teach our children about the meaning of this day. We visit memorials and cemeteries. We live lives that reflect the values they fought to defend. There is a quiet strength in remembrance. It does not demand attention or seek applause. It reminds us of who we are and what we stand for. Let us remember from the Rose Croix. **"Your duty is not to be better than your neighbor but to be better than yourself. The more you have the more you owe to those who need your assistance."** To those who gave the ultimate sacrifice, we remember you, we honor you, and we will strive to be worthy of your sacrifice and "We will never forget".

**BROTHER LIEUTENANT COLONEL HARRY SANDERS, 33°
RECOGNIZED BY SCOUTING AMERICA FOR 60 YEARS OF SERVICE**

In ceremonies conducted on 15 FEB 2026 in Greenville, NC, Valley of New Bern Brother Lt Col Sanders, 33° was recognized by the East Carolina Council of Scouting America with the 60 Year Veteran Award. The citation accompanying the award and signed by Roger Krone, President and CEO of Scouting America, reads in part, as follows:

“Congratulations on dedicating 60 years of service to the Boy Scouts of America. Your years of service have demonstrated a deep commitment to serving youth, families and communities and you have our deepest thanks and respect.

You’re among the volunteer heroes on whom Scouting is built. Thanks to you, countless young people have become caring and responsible citizens. That’s a contribution only a select few can match....”

Brother Lt Col Sanders, 33° became a Cub Scout in 1951 as a member of Pack 361, Ellicott City, Maryland. During a Scouting career that extends over 6 decades, he served in 6 Councils (Baltimore, MD; Tewksbury, MA; Beaver Creek, OH; Las Vegas, NV; Burke, VA; and Chocowinity, NC), as a Cubmaster, Scoutmaster, District Commissioner, and District Chairman. Two Councils have recognized his work with their District Award of Merit. He served as a member of the Wood Badge 1981 training staff in Utah; received specialized training at Philmont Scout Ranch; and was a 1982 recipient of the Silver Beaver Award

from the Boulder Dam Council (now the Las Vegas Area Council) in Las Vegas, NV where one of his legacy programs continues as an annual event --- the WEBELOS WACKY RACE. He has served as a staff member for three national Jamborees; the 1985 Diamond Jubilee National Jamboree at Fort A. P. Hill; the 100th Anniversary of Scouting BSA National Jamboree at Fort A. P. Hill in 2010; and the inaugural Jamboree at the new Bechtel Reserve property in West Virginia in 2013. In 2010, he became a life member of the National Association of Masonic Scouters and was presented the Daniel Carter Beard Masonic



Award from the Grand Lodge of Virginia on July 9, 2013. More recently, he completed his Seabadge as a member of the Sea Scouts. In the East Carolina Council, he has provided leadership for the Pamlico Sea Base Committee for over 12 years, served as District Chair for the Blackbeard District for 5 years, and now serves as the East Carolina Council Vice President for Strategic Planning.

Brother Lt Col Sanders, 33°, in addition to his long time service in the Scottish Rite also served as National Sojourners President in 2010-2011 with the theme DUTY-HONOR-COUNTRY.

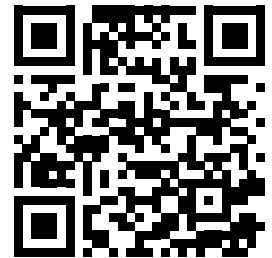

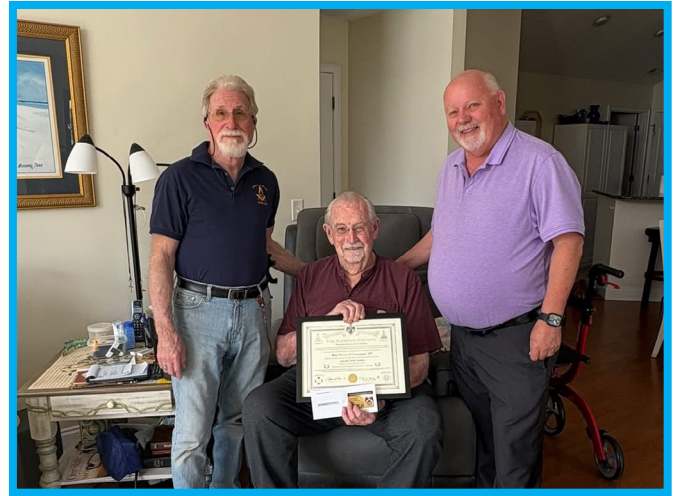
